

Spoken from the hub

I purchased a new project car (a 1938 Packard Club Coupe) a few weeks ago and I had for gotten how much frustration and pleasure a new project car can cause. I want to start by thanking Reggie Goolsby and Otto Vallastro for their help. I would never have been able to get myself into this mess without their help. We started out by having to recover the car in some of the most ungodly heat we have experienced in many summers and wound up having to make

the trip to Gretna twice to get all of the parts. Once we got the car to my house we had to unload all of the parts and associated junk that came with the car.

The car came from Maine and had been stored in a garage from 1959 to 2003. The person I purchased the Packard from had it in a metal building from 2003 to 2016. The person who had the car when I bought It had removed all of the glass, some of the interior and the complete front end but

the engine nor any of the running gear had been touched The previous owner had started to do the restoration and had really only made the job harder for me. After getting the car to the house I had to go through all of the parts and see what I had and then tried to put them somewhere I could find them again and also get them out of the way. This process took about 3 or 4 days and now I am up to my eyeballs in parts and rat poop.

I started the work of restoration last Monday by removing the motor and transmission. The motor was locked up, and I was told by the previous owner that it had a cracked block, that led me to believe that there was some major problem with the motor.

The car had not run since 1959 so you could imagine what kind of shape everything was in, so I put on some old cloths and grabbed my trusty can penetrating oil and went to work. With Otto's help we removed the manifold and head and found a fairly normal 6 cylinder motor that had all of the valves stuck, I mean really stuck! I slowly removed all of the stuck bolts and got the engine and transmission ready to pull. This process to about 2 to 4 days and I got the engine out. Again with Otto's help we found the real problem, the valves were stuck and rusted so bad that the engine would only rotate less than 180 degrees. It took us all day to get the valves and lifters loosened up and then we could remove the valve springs and get the cam out. We did not see any signs of a cracked block or a thrown rod. In fact the engine looked good.

The next plan is to finish the disassembly of the engine and take it to an engine shop and have the block boiled out and inspected for cracks before I start the rebuild.

There are about a million things to do so I will be busy for a long time. Again I cannot thank Reggie and Otto enough for their help.

Here's a sample:

The Edsel Man, Harvey Elder [The following first appeared in a 2005 issue of the Hub & Spoke] Back in the heyday of CB radios, there was one guy with a handle that perfectly fit, this month's sponsor, Harvey Elder – "Edsel Man." Harvey has owned Edsels since well before they became highly desired collectors' cars, even back to the times when the very word "Edsel" was a comedian's sure bet laugh line.

Over the years since, Edsels have taken Harvey and Joyce to almost all of the states of the union. A memorable trip was in an Edsel station wagon all the way to California and back. One highlight was a drive through a giant red wood tree, another a drive on a giant red wood tree – ask Harvey for details. Harvey has owned a variety of Edsels but his all time favorite is the red 1960 convertible we all know.

Worse than all the other problems attending the Edsel's introduction was the looks of the car itself. With its horse collar grill and other styling details, the Edsel simply looked radically different from the good old middle American Buick or even a Mercury. In Eisenhower's America of the late 1950s. "different" was not a synonym for "good." Coincidentally. another new American car introduced about two decades prior to the Edsel had similar teething problems: the "coffin nosed" Cord of 1936 looked radically different and had many early production quality problems. It died in only two production years. Today, both the Cord and the Edsel are among the most sought after cars by collectors. Do you think 50 years from

today some AACA editor will be telling a similar story about the Pontiac Aztec?







Next of course is the fascinating story of the 1955 T-Bird! Originally sold new by Harvey, purchased in 1969 by Harvey; sold in 1972; repurchased in 2009; restored by Tri-County Ford, Keysville, VA.
