

Donnie owns & maintains a quartet of interesting cars. First is the featured car – '68 Pontiac Firebird.





The Firebird was purchased by Donnie over thirty-one years ago. It has a matching number 400 CID (6.6L) 4V, Muncie four speed trans, factory Hurst shifter, factory hood tach, factory red-on-red with one repaint, 10.75 compression, and original AM/FM radio.



The '68 Firebird has a 160 MPH speedometer ('68 Camaros only had 120 MPH). This car is the forerunner to the Firebird <u>Trans AM</u> which was introduced in very limited numbers in '69. HP was underrated at 330 (W2 Code) for safety concerns.



On each corner of this convertible are vibration dampeners called "cocktail shakers" installed to help prevent vibrations because of the lack of the roof structure. The cocktail shakers are large cans with a suspended mass on a spring in a viscous fluid tuned to a resonant frequency of the convertible that caused the vibration problems. When the body was subjected to loading that would otherwise tend to make it oscillate, much of the energy was instead absorbed by the motion of the masses in the cocktail shakers - which reduced the vibration in the body. The cocktail shakers weight about 25 pounds each.

Work has been done to keep the car as original as possible. Guy who sold it to Donnie said that his wife told him to get rid of the car or her. Wonder how it worked out for the seller ---worked out great for Donnie! (Editorial comment: Wikipedia and other sources list the '68 Firebird convertible total manufactured as 16,960. Exact #s for this high option package couldn't be confirmed in time for this H&S) Next going in a different direction is an oldschool hot rod --- <u>1948 Ford</u> coupe.



Dummy spots, baby Moons, no front bumper, mostly Oldsmobile running gear, flat black primer paint, fits right into the style of car that we all wanted back-in-the-day. Donnie stated that having owned the car for about ten years it's still a work in progress. Wasn't that true of all hot rods of our youth?

The '48 Ford is a great driver and runs well at any speed.

'68 Mustang



His 1968 Mustang is original outside and has a super solid body. The motor is not original having a built 351 Winsor mated to a top loader four speed transmission.



<u>'73 Maverick</u>



The Ford Maverick is a 1973 Grabber that Donnie bought as a super nice body missing most of it's running gear. He dropped in a built 302 flat-top piston, roller rockers, aluminum heads, balanced and blue printed. He obtained the original rear end for it which has a mini spool (true posi-traction), factory 3.55 gears, and a Borg Warner T10 transmission. Again,

Donnie built it the way that he wanted it. The car has '72 bumpers and the '72 stripe kit and hood. The car was shown at the Maverick/Comet Nations held at the Kirkly Hotel in Lynchburg in 7/2018 and received an award in the '73 Modified Class.

(Editorial comment: The name "<u>Maverick</u>" was derived from the word for an unbranded range steer. The Grabber option was only available for a few early Maverick years. This car was a good choice for a horsepower transfusion because it only weighed approx. 2900 pounds with its original drive train. Light weight/max BHP = smiles per miles.)



UPDATE: Shanna & John Kenny's Ferrari (originally featured in the August 2018 Hub & Spoke)

It's been a busy year in our garage trying to get our '62 Ferrari 250 GTE ready for her first outing since the 70s. At the beginning of this year we set a goal to have the car mechanically recommissioned and to get as much re-assembled as possible to make it to Euro Auto Festival in Greenville, SC on October 20th. It was significant to us on a personal level since the 20th was our 34th anniversary. I wanted Shanna to drive or ride onto the show field in the car she had last ridden in when she was a little girl growing up in Germany.

<u>We made it!</u> It was close to get the car put back together but the car was running well thanks to help from my friend Michael Yount, Charles Thaxton and a final tune and brake booster rebuild by Radcliffe Motors in Owings Mills, MD.



We ended up having the oldest Ferrari at the show which featured Italian cars this year. As a result we had the 1st spot entering the Italian car section of the show and our girl got lots of attention. Even though the interior is not complete yet and we have things to sort out cosmetically; the car was nominated for an award by Keith Martin of Sports Car Market Letter. That was a surprise for sure. If there was a down side to that, we only lost out to a Ferrari 512 Boxer for best vintage Ferrari. Needless to say we were very happy with the way the car is progressing and we'll hope to have it at our club events next year. Many thanks to the folks that helped bring our girl back from another long nap and for the interest and support from our club.

LYNCHBURG REGION AACA MEETING MINUTES OCTOBER 29, 2018

Meeting called to order by Charles Thaxton, President at 6:25 pm.

Charles led the Pledge Allegiance to the Flag and asked for a moment of silence.

Treasurer, Ron Blalock read his report. Motion made to accept this report and seconded and passed by member's vote.

NEW BUSINESS:

Mike Brady, a Vietnam Veteran, spoke about the Lynchburg Veterans Parade at Liberty University on Saturday, November 10th from 11:00am to 1:00pm. Those planning on participating in the parade need to be at LU behind TRBC at 9:30am. There will be some form of communication between Charles and Mike Brady. They will assign Veterans to ride with us, as needed. October 10th is the actual date of the 243rd Birthday of the United States Marine Corp. To celebrate this event, Dan Villarial, an 89 year old Marine WWII Veteran will be the Grand Marshal of the Veterans Parade. Mike said they were expecting about 500 veterans to attend the parade.

Mike asked how many vets were present at our AACA meeting. There were at least 16 present. Mike spoke about the Lynchburg Area Veterans Council (sponsor of the Veterans Parade) and their funding raised for area veterans. He said that \$.90 of every \$1.00 goes to the benefit of area vets. None of the LAVC members collect any form of salary. The LAVC will be offering Memorial Bricks for Veterans of any War or branch of service for \$50.00 a brick. To add a service branch emblem to a brick, the cost will be an additional \$6.00. These bricks will be placed at Monument Terrace. The funds raised will be used to benefit area veterans. There will be an order form on their web site, <u>www.LAVC.us</u>.

Mike presented to all those present a LAVC badge with their new logo.

They would like to have as many cars as possible to accommodate as many veterans as possible. Please go to the LAVC website and sign up your car.

Our new Webmaster, Kathy Wesley, brought her laptop and projector and made a presentation on our new website. She demonstrated how to search for information about events, Hub and Spoke, and the requirements for membership, membership renewal, and new member application. Kathy also showed the LAVC website and how to register your car for the parade. Kathv mentioned that any member can call the National AACA to get answers to questions. She said that you have to have a National AACA membership number in order to join the Lynchburg Region AACA. Kathy has requested you to email her a photo of your car with the make, model, and year if you want your car photo on our home page.
