

A successful Club trip was taken to the Roanoke Transportation Museum with lunch following. Here's info from the Museum's website (www.vmt.org):

"The coming of the railroad to Big Lick in the 1850s changed the little hamlet into the City of Roanoke, today Virginia's largest city west of Richmond. The Museum's extensive rail collection and exhibits interpret the rail industry's rich history and its impact on Roanoke and beyond.

The Roanoke Transportation Museum, originally formed as a partnership of the Norfolk & Western Railway and the City of Roanoke, first opened its doors in 1963 in Wasena Park

along the Roanoke River. Although all modes of transportation were represented, the Museum focused on telling the story of Roanoke's rich rail heritage.

In 1976, a private non-profit corporation was established to operate the Museum, and in 1983 the Museum was designated as the Official Transportation Museum of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Subsequently, the Museum was renamed the Virginia Museum of Transportation.

Disaster struck the Museum in 1985, when floodwaters surged through the Museum leaving behind \$1.4 million in damages. Norfolk Southern came to the rescue, generously donating the 1918 vintage N&W freight station to be used as the Museum's new home. The Museum is now housed in a 45,000 square foot building adjacent to active Norfolk Southern mainline tracks on 5.75 acres of land in downtown Roanoke.

collection The Museum's includes approximately 2,500 objects, including more than 50 pieces of rolling stock—locomotives and other rail cars-including the largest collection of diesel locomotives in the South. The Museum expanded its collection to include automotive, aviation, transit, and other artifacts and frequently exhibits loaned objects. The Museum exists to preserve Virginia's transportation history and to honor the workers whose talents created the transportation marvels in our collection.

The legendary Norfolk & Western Railway, headquartered in Roanoke, was a true American success story. In its Roanoke Shops, the Norfolk & Western created the world's most powerful steam locomotives. Only at the Virginia Museum of Transportation can you see and board the last two that still exist: the massive Class A 1218, known as the 'Mercedes of Steam,' and the sleek Class J 611, the most advanced passenger steam engine ever built."

#### 1923 Piedmont

Again from the Museum's website: "Piedmont Motor is the only automobile company ever chartered in the State of Virginia. The company's primary vehicle was a touring car with either a 6 cylinder (Model 6-40) or a 4 cylinder (Model 4-30) engine. Both models carried 5 passengers.

During its brief period of existence, the Piedmont Motor Car Company produced approximately 3,000 vehicles. At its peak, output reached 5-6 automobiles per day. Although the company claimed that the cars were not "assembled" (from purchased parts manufactured elsewhere), only the body was produced at the Lynchburg plant. Piedmont was the brand name of cars sold through the company's network of agents. However, cars were also produced for other companies such as Bush (Chicago), Lone Star (Texas) and Alsace (Europe).

Piedmont's short life is attributed to price and management issues. The vehicle had no special features or performance advantages, yet it was priced (at \$1,500 - \$2,000) hundreds of dollars higher than the popular Ford Model-T. Sales agents for Piedmont frequently complained that delivery of vehicles was poor because international markets and other companies consumed production capacity. Unable to deliver ordered cars to their customers, the agents began to focus on other lines. Only three Piedmont vehicles are known to exist. The Virginia Museum of Transportation is proud to exhibit one of the three, a 1923 Piedmont 4-30 Touring Car.

- Production era: 1917 1922
- Passengers: 5
- Top speed: 45 mph
- Cost: \$1,395. Wire wheels (instead of wood) an extra cost

Oak Ridge Estate Tour October 24, 2015 Tony Simmons, Pics by Tony, R. Goolsby, C. Thaxton



LAACA members were given a guided tour to the mansion located on Oak Ridge Estate. The original land goes back to a land grant in 1750 and after passing through various hands became the property of the Rives family who constructed the original portion of the mansion around 1802. Property changed hands again after the Civil War and after some ups & downs in business the estate was purchased in 1901 by Thomas Fortune Ryan.



Ryan was Nelson County, VA born and it was he who expanded the original building to a fifty room Colonial Revival mansion. He also had constructed a race track (circa 1909), chapel, railroad station, reservoir, telephone station, movie theater, elaborate green house, and many other buildings.



Where did Ryan get his multiple millions? (Info obtained from Wikipedia):

"In 1872, Ryan opened a brokerage firm with two partners, Lee, Ryan & Warren, in New York City.

In 1873 Ryan married his former boss's daughter, Ida Mary Barry, whose family were devout Roman Catholics. They had seven children. In 1874, his firm purchased Ryan a seat on the New York Stock Exchange. At the same time, Ryan became active in politics, especially the Tammany Hall machine that controlled much of the city's operations, giving him political and industrial contacts across the city.

Ryan's fortune began in public transit. In 1883, he founded the New York Cable Railroad and bid the proposed route from lower on Manhattan to Midtown. After numerous legal and financial problems, in 1886 Ryan reorganized his cable railroad as the Metropolitan Traction Company. By 1893, construction of Ryan's rail system underwav on Broadway. Metropolitan continually acquired additional lines so that by 1900 it controlled 3,000 cars and 300 miles of track the majority of New York's streetcar operations.

Ryan's most profitable investment was tobacco. Having invested in its stocks throughout the 1890s, Ryan joined tobacco assets in 1898, forming The Union Tobacco Company. Shortly thereafter, he merged Union Tobacco with his greatest competitor, James Duke of North

Carolina, forming the American Tobacco Company. Together Ryan and Duke developed the British-American Tobacco Company to protect American tobacco trade in Europe. Upon his death, Ryan also had major holdings in R. J. Reynolds and Liggett & Myers.

In 1905, amid public outcry, Ryan purchased the \$400-million-strong Equitable Life Assurance Society, a major factor in the insurance industry. Although Ryan strove to make Equitable more responsive to its policy holders, public reaction to his purchase was overwhelmingly negative. His reputation for cutthroat business dealings in the streetcar and subway businesses made the public distrustful. In 1909, Ryan sold his Equitable stock. Also in 1905. Rvan's Metropolitan street car system was threatened by New York's increasingly popular subway system. He merged Metropolitan with August Jr.'s Interborough Rapid Belmont. Company. But the joint company's finances were shaky, and Ryan pulled out. Meanwhile, some \$35 million that Ryan had raised in a bond issue were misappropriated (stolen!). Ryan was investigated for corruption in 1908, but the grand jury brought no charges.

Meanwhile, Ryan was making fortunes with coal mines, banks, public utilities and railroads. He owned Royal Typewriter and backed the maker of the Thompson submachine gun. At one time Ryan had controlling interest in 30 corporations."

Unfortunately, the house was vacant from 1970 until 1989; then the property was purchased by the Holland family. Thus began an era of restoration of the house and property including an expanded carriage house and steeplechase track. Our Classic & Antique vehicles looked quite natural parked around the property as did we:





All eyes were on Rob Harris, our Club's clock expert, as he closely inspected the many clocks in the mansion.



Reggie Goolsby has close ties with the property because his grandfather was the manager of the greenhouse for three years starting in 1919. The greenhouse had an unusual crystal rotunda plus a steam boiler in the basement and its own power plant.



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
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


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
